Covid is still with us and we must continue to mitigate its effects by following the precautions advised

and the situation in Ukraine has brought the fragility of World Peace closer to us than anything in the recent past. Our community will respond positively to these events as indeed it does to global events on a worldwide scale and I know fundraising and support events have already taken place and are planned not only for Ukraine but also for Afghanistan and other humanitarian efforts worldwide and I am sure we will support as many of these as we can.

However we are still short of Councillor's especially amongst the younger and senior members of our community and I would urge anyone who has a strong interest in the Town and its surroundings to please come forward as the current councillors are all becoming busier with work commitments as we enter this busy time of year.

I hope you are able enjoy Easter and the spring to its full.

Public Hall

At the time of going to press the current Tenant of the hall has yet to vacate the premises and therefore we are unable to announce a date for a meeting at the hall to discuss the future. Business Park

The Community College



The Community College celebrates its centenary this year. For 100 years the school has been providing secondary education for the young people of Bishops Castle and its surrounding villages and towns. The college has earnt a good reputation for academic achievement, encouraging aspiration and for its pastoral care. Despite the challenges of the last few years the Community College has continued to perform above national averages on most measures and has grown in pupil size year on year. The school has a steady and committed staff many of whom live in the community.

All schools face extreme financial constraints. For us this has the effect of limiting the amount of extra-curricular activity we can provide. We rely heavily on the good will of our staff to go above and beyond their daily duties. We are extremely limited in our ability to "buy-in" additional support. Even access to the Sparc beyond our scheduled curriculum time is prohibitively expensive.

My colleague, Andrew Kirk has been meeting Andy Stelman regarding the establishment of a Youth Forum. Andy is due to meet our Senate on 23 March to discuss how they might have an influence on future decisions. Other promising recent developments have included the Bright Star Boxing (BC is the apparently the only location where Bright Star has successfully recruited girls to boxing), and the Open Mic nights at the Underground.

We are therefore appealing to the town council to support the school by using its influence and creativity to:

encourage the involvement of local sports clubs and other organisations to provide extra curricular provision or curriculum enrichment opportunities. At the moment we have some volunteers from the community who are offering squash lessons to a handful of our students. This is an excellent example of the provision by volunteers of an opportunity that the college would otherwise be unable to provide. The college is having to cover the additional cost of hiring the squash courts however it would be unfeasible to do this if we had to pay for the volunteers' time too.

to provide support for vulnerable students or those in need, for example help to enable students to study outside school hours, pastoral or emotional support, or support regarding substance abuse.

Support in terms of aspiration. We run a programme of Aspirational Talks through the year where staff use their contacts to invite speakers (live or remote) to talk about their careers. The aim of this is to encourage students to consider life choices that they may not have previously been aware of. Almost all our speakers come from outwith the community. We are keen not to promote the misconception that it is necessary to move out of the area to have a fulfilling life and career. I am sure there are many inspirational people in the community who could contribute towards this aim.

Careers and work experience - this is an area where we have always been very well supported by the community. We run a fortnight of work experience for our Year 10 students in the summer. We are always on the lookout for new organisations who may be able to offer an inspirational experience.

Thank you for inviting me to speak at your meeting tonight. I hope that you will be as enthusiastic as we are to strengthen the ties between community and college. In working together I am confident that we can provide better life chances for the young people of this community which will bring benefit and improvement to the community as a whole. I look forward to hearing your ideas and working more closely with you in the future.

New online coaching service for people who struggle with reading

It's taken for granted that we all learned to read and write at school, however there are many local people who struggle with this essential life skill. Just imagine how your life would be if you couldn't read forms or letters, follow medicine instructions, or read a new recipe?

Free, confidential, one-to-one help

Read Easy Shropshire Hills matches up adults who want to learn to read with a trained reading coach and they work together through reading manuals, in private, at a time to suit them both. It's as easy as that and its free!

What's important is that everyone can learn at their own pace without feeling rushed. There's no pressure or targets or exams to worry about and no reminders of what it was like at school.

Before the pandemic all coaching sessions were held faceto-face in quiet locations such as cafes and libraries, but out of necessity we have had to find new ways to keep on coaching.

Online coaching, using Zoom, has been so successful and

convenient for many reading pairs, that we have decided to use it to reach a much wider population. New readers are provided with a tablet if they don't have access to a computer. It is set up by Read Easy beforehand so it can be used without any computer knowledge or keyboard skills. However, Zoom isn't for everyone and for some of our readers coaching by WhatsApp or phone are better options.

We will continue to offer face-to-face coaching to people who would prefer to meet in person if there is a suitable local venue.

Jay Blades proves it's never too late to learn

Jay Blades, presenter of BBC's Repair Shop, finds reading a challenge. He concealed his inability to read until he was in his 30s, after he struggled to learn to read as a child and compares looking at words on a page to a 'book of ants'. Jay, 51, has been learning to read online with Read Easy in Birmingham and his story was shown on BBC TV earlier this year.

Going Wild in Bishop's Castle

NO MOW MAY

Last year legions of gardeners joined in with No Mow May, run by the charity Plantlife, to help our bees, butterflies, wildlife and us!

Please join in too in 2022.

The **No Mow May** campaign doesn't ask you to do much. In fact, it asks you to not do anything at all...

Just lock up your lawnmower on May 1st and let the wildflowers in your lawn bloom, providing a feast of nectar for our hungry pollina-



tors.

Let it grow... let it grow...

At the end of the month, on the Bank Holiday Weekend, join in with the nationwide 'Every Flower Counts' survey to discover how many bees the UK's lawns can feed. Not only will you receive your own 'nectar score' (which will tell you have many bees your lawn can feed), you'll help us learn more about the health of the nations' wildflowers.

How do I survey my lawn?



Simply count the number of flowers in a square metre patch of lawn and send the results to Plantlife: www.plantlife.org.uk/everyflowercounts.

When it comes to providing vital nectar and pollen for bees, butterflies and other insects, every flower counts and your lawn can help to provide a feast! The more wildflowers in your lawn, the more nectar will be produced. Don't forget the flowers of lawn grasses, these may not look as colourful as wildflowers but they can be favourites of some of our wild pollinators.

What happens then?

At the start of June you can mow your lawn again so get your mower back out. If you've enjoyed seeing the flowers and the insects then how about setting your mower blade high so that low flowering plants like clover or selfheal can still flower.





If you have made a bug hotel, using

our last leaflet, then watch the bees collect pollen from your lawn and then use the hotel to lay their eggs.

Also, at the end of No Mow May, how about keeping that mower locked away for another month and taking part in Let it Bloom June! By leaving your lawn uncut for two months you may see some of our summer wildflowers coming through and getting a chance to flower. After two months without mowing it will be harder to cut and may need a strim-



mer or scythe. After cutting make sure you rake up all of the grass cuttings. This is really important, if the cuttings are left unraked, or are mulched into the lawn then the wildflowers and fine grasses will be smothered and over time, will be lost.

But I like having a short lawn.

There's no need to do the whole of your lawn, how about cutting part of it and leaving the rest as a No Mow area.



Maybe you can make the unmown part into an attractive shape or mow a little path through it for exploring. A small patch is miles better than none, so do what works for you, your garden and your family.
