During February half term, the **Bishop's Castle Arts Festival** was held. There

was quite a buzz around town with many events – exhibitions, workshops, concerts, even a play at the Three Tuns depicting a despotic mayor of Bishop's Castle - happening across the week. HM THE KING'S CORONATION!

EVENTS OVER THE WEEKEND OF 6TH & 7TH MAY

Saturday 6th May

No exact timings have yet been announced for The Coronation, but the service is expected to start at around 11am.

From 10 am – to be confirmed - there will be a live stream of the Coronation Service and Processions in <u>St John the Baptist Church</u>. <u>Please bring a picnic</u> to enjoy and share to help make it a really enjoyable community event. Please see sign outside Church for details.

Sunday 7th May

There will be a special commemorative <u>Service of Thanksgiving</u> for the Coronation of King Charles at 11am in St John the Baptist Church.

There will be an open "Mayor's afternoon tea and street party" in the public hall from 1PM UNTIL 5PM. Wendy Oakley will be providing the refreshments. Tables and chairs will be provided on Station Street and also in the hall. I hope as many people as possible will come along so we can all get together as a community.

The Town is very fortunate to be hosting <u>Wynns Fun Fair</u> the Coronation weekend. Wynns has kindly agreed to stay in town for another day, SUNDAY 7TH. Also, with agreement from the fair and in conjunction with the town council, a half price ticket is available for rides for the children of the Town. These can be redeemed on the Sunday only. Before that weekend I will go to Bishop's Castle Primary School to personally hand out the tickets to the children. There will also be a limited number of half price tickets for under 16s for the fair available at the tea party on the Sunday, on a first come first served basis.

The fair and tea and street party will provide a special opportunity for the town to celebrate together.

There will hopefully be many people around that weekend and it would be wonderful if as many people as possible could put something red, white and blue in their windows – even dust off the Christmas lights – to help make a truly Royal show!

Traffic update

We would like to thank those who have submitted comments on the traffic update in last Town newsletter. There was broad consensus on the overall proposal. The Council will now move forward on the various action points.

Specific areas on which comments were received, and where further action may be needed:

- a) 'to clarify whether the objective of the Access Only area was to stop or to deter HGVs and through traffic from coming into the narrow streets of the town'. Traffic will not be stopped as deliveries will have to be made and it is recognised that through travellers often only visit when they see the delights of Bishop's Castle. The objective is to encourage those who have no intention of stopping to keep to the wider roads and by having a designated area, to stop satnavs from bringing vehicles through the town;
- b) 'to emphasise that it is not acceptable for cars to park on the pavements in Salop Street or Welsh Street or outside the Spar'. The Council recognises that the town does have a parking issue, that car parks and other parking areas need to be better signposted and that room is left for emergency vehicles to get through. In the areas mentioned above, more education is needed to ensure space is left on pavements for mums with buggies and the less able to get through.
- c) 'the junction at the bottom of Kerry Lane is dangerous for pedestrians. At the very least there needs to be some traffic 'calming' or other action to make it safer people to cross there'. This is under review. It is an increasingly busy junction and various options are being considered.

Action points

1. The introduction of 'Access only' signs. These signs will be positioned at Castle Street, Welsh Street, Salop Street, New Street, Union Street at the Harley Jenkins street junction and at the Church

Street/High Street/Station Street/Union Street cross roads. Underway.

- 2. A 20 mph speed limit for the town. Currently waiting to see if costs will be covered by central government.
- 3. A review of signs on the outskirts of the town to stop heavy vehicles (HGVs) from coming through the town. Underway.
- 4. A review of parking spaces for the disabled. Underway
- 5. Better signage to and for the car parks. Underway.
- 6. A plan for more electric charge points. Underway.
- 7. A review to be undertaken on whether traffic calming measures are needed at Kerry Lane/Six Bells/Brampton Road and Castle Green junctions and in areas where pedestrians have to walk in the roadway.
- 8. Action to promote more considerate parking.

Note: Shropshire Council has confirmed that resurfacing of Market Square, High Street and the top end of Church Street is still in the Capital Programme for 2023/24. Assurances regarding 'access' have been received.

LOCAL NEWS

NHS Community Engagement Event – On Wednesday March 1st two sessions were held at the Methodist Hall, Bishop's Castle to discuss ambulance services, mental health service and the wider health needs of our community generally. Because of concerns about the future of the local hospital many more people than expected turned up with sadly a few having to be turned away. A larger venue will be found for any future meetings. The event provided an opportunity to show the NHS Director and Chief executive the hospital and drive home the point that the hospital was fit for purpose subject to staff being available and that the extreme rurality of the area means that local services are needed.

Other topics discussed included access to dentistry services, mental health services, services for young people, early years services including breastfeeding advice and ante natal services, local in patient community beds, out patient services, the distance involved in travelling to centralised services, poor ambulance response time, services for people with a learning disability and more. Many people attended from outside the townincluding Mainstone, Lydham, Norbury, Chirbury, Edgton, Clun, Lydbury North and Marton.

Bishop's Castle Food Bank – at the Church Barn Tuesday 10-11.30 and Thursday 2.30 – 4pm. No referral required. Donations (dried and tinned food, breakfast cereal, pasta sauces and long life milk) are always welcome.

Bishop's Castle Charter Celebrations – to mark 450 years of the granting of the Charter to the town a celebratory day will be held on July 16th. Further details to follow. Anyone with photographs or memorabilia of the 400 year celebrations held in 1973 is invited to get in touch with Bishop's Castle Heritage Resource Centre which is looking for material for an exhibition.

The Stars, A new life: The Community Land Trust is pressing ahead with the Stars development as a Community space to be made available on short term lets to local organisations and businesses, with two 'housing needs' flats above. Work on underpinning part of the

front of the building has started and the joinery for a new shop front has already been delivered; it is all stacked up safe inside to be installed as soon as possible. With two reclaimed cast iron columns, it will be much more in keeping with other shops in the town centre. In the meantime the front part will be available as a pop up venue – usually for a week at a time. 'The Equinox on 20th of March marked the beginning of Spring, so this feels like a good time to mark a new chapter in the story of 68-70 Church Street' said Jonathan Brown, secretary to the Trust. 'After six years of lying empty, it's really exciting to see that progress is being made at last'

The Bishop's Castle 2023 Arts Festival - Reports from everyone involved in the 2023 Bishop's Castle Arts Festival are very positive. It was a great success. Over six days the town shone in the winter sunshine as local residents and visitors took in the workshops, performances, talks, displays, open studios and other exhibitions. Well over 400 people visited the display in the Public Hall with sales in excess of £2,000 recorded. The atmosphere was wonderful. Hostelries, coffee shops, cafes and art sellers did a brisk trade. The event would not have been such a success without the hard work of Sue Willmer and her team at the Town Hall and of the Bishop's Castle Arts Society . The participation of so many people demonstrated the talent of musicians, artists, lecturers who live in this small town. It is extraordinary. Huge thanks go to everyone involved including those who visited and supported the various venues and events .



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Voter ID -

A reminder that photograph ID will be required for future voting at Polling Stations. This is not required for postal votes. No elections are planned in the Shropshire Council area this vear. From February 2023 onwards anyone who does not have one of the accepted forms of ID such as a UK, European Economic Area (EEA) or Commonwealth passport; a UK, EEA or Commonwealth drivers' licence: and some concessionary travel passes, such as an older person's bus pass.



Voters will also be able to use expired ID if they are still recognisable from the photo. Voters will also be able to apply for free ID – known as a Voter Authority Certificate at www.voter-authority-certificate.service.gov.uk/ or by completing a paper form.

If anyone is not registered to vote and wishes to do so you can register online www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.

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



Poor Turnout Puts Hall's future in Jeopardy

Efforts to form a new management committee for Bishop's Castle Public Hall have faltered following a low turnout at a recent public meeting. Last year a small group, mainly made up of town councillors, was set up to investigate the condition of the current hall and to propose a strategy or strategies to move the hall forward. The development of the strategy, once agreed, would be under the management of a 'new' committee, not the Town Council who act merely as Custodian Trustees.

Cllr Grant Perry presented a paper on the future of the hall for discussion at the recent meeting. However as, with the low turnout at the meeting, it did not prove viable to form a new committee it was proposed that the six options outlined for the hall and site be circulated to the community at large so that everyone could vote for their preferred option.

The outcome will establish a strategy in which the majority are in favour. It is believed having more clarity will aid the formation of a new committee to progress the vision and raise the funds required. As The Town Council as Custodian Trustee is not able to progress the project, the scheme can only progress if a new committee steps forward.

- 1. Bring the current building up to the required Standards. This would be very difficult and costly.
- Replace the current building with a new one on the existing footprint with particular emphasis on maintaining the Underground as a separate entity. Costly.

- 3. Replace the current building with a new one on a reduced footprint with particular emphasis on maintaining the Underground as a separate entity. This would allow the possible disposal on some of the land to produce funds for the new building.
- 4. Dispose of the site and use the proceeds with Charity Commission's agreement on the development of a new Hall on a new site.
- Dispose of the site and use the proceeds with Charity Commission's agreement on a development to augment an existing hall in the locality. Subject to agreement of the appropriate bodies concerned.
- 6. Dispose of the site and use the proceeds with Charity Commission's agreement on the development of other projects in the town such as a Youth Club/Building (the old crowgate site has been suggested), Fitness trail (in the town centre playing fields) or Sports Provision (on the school Sports Field)
