HAPPY NEW YEAR from your Mayor and Town Council

Hello and welcome to this latest edition of the Town's newsletter I! It seems like it was just yesterday when I was writing my last piece before Christmas. Once again a lot has happened, and a lot more is already planned for 2024. I have said over the past two years that it is going to be a quieter year, and it turns out to be the total opposite. I really wouldn't have it any other way! It's all about what is the best for the community and

how to ensure the benefits for the Town will continue to increase!

It is great to see Shropshire included in ABTAs world Top 10 destinations for 2024, with a special feature on Bishop's Castle. I really do hope this brings more visitors to the Town and area, helping all the businesses who benefit from such interest.

In months to come keep your eyes peeled on news regarding the formation of a new Chamber of Trade, something which is much needed, helping businesses unite in a time when they need it most. Any interested businesses who want more details, please get in touch with me.

I am pleased to announce that we have invited five people to become new Town Councillors, following our co-option process. This will be finalised at February's Meeting. These people will bring much expertise and insight to the table, bringing the number of councillors up to the full quota of 12. My big wish is to have a full election in May 2025, so the Town can vote and have a say in local democracy. At the time of writing this article, I have much hope that our beloved Community Hospital is edging nearer to opening its doors fully once again. The Save Our Beds group has worked tirelessly to get us to this point. Many people sit around the table every two weeks without fail, all with so much love and determination to get over that line. I would also like to thank those existing staff who are eagerly waiting to get back to work in Bishop's Castle, which they love , headed up by Ward Manager, Amanda, who I know is working so hard on top of her full time job to get to the result we all want. Keep your eyes peeled on the Old Stars shop window opposite CO-OP for any more news and potential public update meeting dates in the coming months.

From comments received I think we all agree that the new Christmas lights looked fantastic and very in keeping with the Town. I must admit, I didn't quite know what I was buying until they turned up! But as always in usual Castle fashion, it has ended up a success story! A big thank you goes to all those who sponsored and donated money to make this happen. There will be more fundraisers held over the year to finish paying for them!

Looking forward, hopefully we can get the pump track project over the line in the early spring. This project really will be beneficial for many people of the town and area, especially the youth! The Council has decided to sell the red shelter and put money towards more user friendly benches and bins. I really hope that once this is all tidied up and made usable for all it stays that way. It has already taken much of the time of myself and others in the community to get to this point. More about the project can be found further on in this newsletter.

The War Memorial will be refurbished delicately in April, to give it the respect it deserves. It is a big passion of mine to get this project done and that it is there for the people of the Town generations which follow. More details about fundraising are further on in this newsletter.

Highways is being covered further on in this publication but, over the past few weeks, I have met with senior figures from Shropshire Council regarding issues on highways in the area. I hope that these meetings will help our cause and get the attention this area deserves. For example they are now fully aware of the situation of Community College which has the A488 running through the middle of the site but which has not been included in their 20 MPH school plan. The state and conditions of roads in the area were also highlighted to them. I will keep on banging the drum for us!

This is only just the beginning. Conversations will be happening soon regarding the house building embargo we are under in this part is Shropshire. This current embargo will not help generations of my age and ones to follow wishing to buy homes in the area.

I have been contacted on numerous occasions regarding parking and speeding in the town centre. I have seen some classic Castle parking going on over winter. In all seriousness please consider carefully how you park and where you park. For example in the Harley Jenkins street car park, the electric charging points and disabled spaces are being used as normal parking spots. Please be considerate to others. The speed of which some vehicles travel through town is also a worry, the Council is actively looking at what can be done to slow vehicles down.

On that note I am going to stop waffling and leave you in peace! Here's to a very exciting 2024. Best wishes. Josh

War memorial to be restored

On 8th April work is to start on the restoration of the War Memorial outside the Church of St John the Baptist. The memorial commemorates those from Bishop's Castle and the surrounding area who lost their lives in World War 1 and Word War 2. Many of the inscriptions are now hard to read and to properly respect the memory of these valiant sons and daughters of the town the work needs to be undertaken. Some funds have already been raised and there is an event at Camlad Barns on 24th February – see Mayor's message – and a quiz in the Six Bells to raise top up the finances. Around £1,500 is needed. Shropshire is a rural gem, but it was also the birthplace of the industrial revolution and history lovers must make a trip to Coalbrookdale in the Ironbridge Gorge with its elegant eponymous iron bridge, the first ever built in the world.'

SUPPORT FOR COMMUNITY HEAT NETWORK

The Town Council is supporting an application to the Department of Energy's 'Community Energy Fund' by Community Heat Network for the grant of £220k to take forward the next stage of work. It fully supports the Bishop's Castle C Community Heat Network project. Like other small rural market towns with no connection on to the gas grid and older , poorly insulated housing, Bishop's Castle's carbon footprint is well above the UK average. This project will reduce the town's carbon footprint and, by supplying heat and surplus electricity to our Community College, Leisure Centre and swimming pool, it will help to ensure their future sustainability and viability. It would also supply some of the older houses in Town, ones that would find it difficult to install air-source heat pumps and could be of great benefit in improving our housing stock.

<u>Community Asset Transfer of the former</u> <u>Abattoir building in Bishop's Castle</u>

At the Cabinet meeting held in December, Shropshire Council confirmed the Community Asset Transfer of the former Abattoir building, behind the old Stars newsagents, to Bishop's Castle Community Land Trust. It is planned to use the building as the new and permanent home for Bishop's Castle Food Bank once the renovation work has been completed. In the meantime the Food Bank will remain at the Church Barn where it is open Tuesday 10 - 11.30 am and Thursdays 2.30 - 4pm Donations of dry and tinned goods, long life milk and cereal is always welcome. No referral is required to use the food bank, just turn up.

Help is around – you just need to know where to go!

Cost of Living

If you are struggling with the ongoing cost of living pressures it is important to check that you are receiving all eligible benefits. You can find out more on the Shropshire Council web site <u>Cost of living help | Shropshire Council</u>. You may also wish to consider:

Pension Credit – for people over 66 whose income is under £220 per week for a single person or £320 if a couple it is worth checking eligibility for pension credit. This is a means tested benefit but you can have some savings and own your own home and still be eligible. This is a gateway benefit so it is always worth applying as even if you only get awarded £2 per week, for example, it means access to other benefits such as a free TV licence if aged over 75 and potential help with rent and council tax. Attendance Allowance – is a non means tested benefit for people over 65 who need help or care to live independently at home. You are also eligible if you fund your own care in a care home. There are two types of free school meals: Government (benefits-related) free school meals and Universal infant free school meals. 



SpArC

Traffic update

It has been agreed by Shropshire Council, which is responsible for traffic issues, to change the traffic flow at the Union Street, Church Street, Station Street junction so that the main road and through traffic will be directed up Station Street/Church Street. The junction and its road marking will be changed to reflect this. At the top of town through traffic will be directed down Station Street with appropriate signs at the entrances to the conservation area at the top of Castle Street and Salop Street.

A 20 MPH limit is being proposed for Brampton Road bordering The Community College. The Council also continues to push for a reduced speed limit near the Community College on the 488 and a pedestrian crossing to the sports field. As yet nothing has been confirmed on this.

A 20 MPH limit may also be introduced on the road passing Norbury School.

A second disabled parking space is to be introduced outside the pharmacy/chemist and one put in on the Auction Yard and on Market Place.

Church Evolution Project

Many people who live in the town, especially those who have recently been to Christmas events and services, weddings and funerals, concerts and fairs will appreciate, St John the Baptist Church in Bishop's Castle is an amazing venue and the largest meeting space we have. It is a resource that needs to be nurtured and developed if we are to keep it as a valuable community asset in years to come.

A small group comprising six people from St John the Baptist Church in Bishop's Castle and the local community are therefore in the first stages of developing a new project known as The Church Evolution Project. Its aim is to work with and consult local community groups and others to establish how the church building could be used and developed to better meet community needs both now and in the future.

A church meeting held last year agreed the go-head for the project and the Church Evolution Group has since consulted other churches that have completed similar successful projects, as well as outside agencies whose job it is to support community development. Once the group has acquired the necessary grant funding for the community consultation exercise, the project can begin in earnest in Spring/ Summer 2024.

Cottage hospital up date

Three successful recruitment days have been held so far with a fourth planned in February. Good progress has been made on the recruitment of qualified nurses. However there are still vacancies, partly dependent on staff recruitment for Ludlow hospital so that nurses relocated there on a temporary basis can be freed to move back to Bishop's Castle. The fact that Bishop's Castle is such a great place to live and work will help to attract the right people. There is however some way to go and we must still continue to apply all the pressure we can for a positive result.

Pump Track for Bishop's Castle

Bishop's Castle is to have a new Pump Track which it is hoped will open at end April or early May with an official ribbon cutting and demonstrations on vintage BMX bikes, stalls refreshments and music. The track is being built on the playing field next to the Skate Park. It will be similar to the one in the photograph.

The Pump Track will be a 100 metre circuit made of supper smooth tarmac with lumps and bumps and corners. Basically, from an inclined ramp riders on BMX style bikes will go round the circuit under the track their own volition; it has just been made an Olympic sport. The track will be open to everyone and can be used by skateboards, roller blades, old fashioned roller skates and mountain and ordinary bikes. In part of the country there are even roller blading club evenings for men and women. It is the basis for a growing number of sports.

The project is the brainchild of ex Councillor Steve Whittingham – Whitty from the Happy Bap – who worked with Johnny Groves of Shape and Scape a company which design Motorcross courses. Advice and support was also given by Clive Jones and by Tim Perks, who lives in BC, who was British BMX champion in the 1980s. Thanks go to them and to the Mayor and Town Council, the

High Sherriff and other funders who helped find the £50,000 needed. The project was complicated as the playing field is currently reminiscent of the Somme with springs appearing everywhere – as elsewhere in BC. A special 'French drain' had to be built to ensure that the track does not get wet and icy.

Over the past year there have been reports and complaints by local residents and park users of anti social behaviour – intimidation of younger children by older children, un acceptable levels of noise, bad language and offensive graffiti – mainly emanating from the skate park shelter. The problem has been exacerbated by the shape of the shelter which seemed to amplify 'boom box' noise, especially in the evenings. Repeated requests have been made for shelter users to have respect for local residents - but to no avail. It has therefore been decided to take down and remove the shelter as soon as possible – and for the foreseeable future. It is believed the removal of the shelter will help solve the problem.

2024 Arts Festival

The first Arts Festival was held in 2011 and only one year has been missed, in 2021 because of Covid. The Festival started as a three day event but soon grew to five days as it was so successful and attracted so many people. .

This year's programme, as in previous years, includes exhibitions, workshops, music, film, dance, talks and an Artisan Market. These take place in a variety of locations throughout Bishop's Castle.

The Festival was started by the Bishop's Castle Tourism Group and is held in February to encourage a larger number of visitors to Bishop's Castle in what is historically a very quiet time of year.

The festival itself is run entirely by volunteers and a lot of events are free, so that it is as inclusive as possible. All events for children are free.

People come from far and wide and for five days the town is absolutely buzzing.

Thanks go to small committee under the leadership of Sue Willmer and a group of volunteers who are invaluable to the success of the festival.

We have over 60 different events spread over all available venues in town, including the Three Tuns and the Six Bells.

YOUTH MAKES MUSIC - TO HELP END POLIO

Pupils from local schools will shortly have their chance to support the world-wide effort to eradicate polio by performing in a special concert being arranged by Ludlow Rotary Club.

'Youth Makes Music' is the name of a concert to be held at the Ludlow Assembly Rooms on 1 March beginning at 7pm.

The concert will be given by pupils from a number of local schools in South Shropshire and North Herefordshire comprising Ludlow Primary School, Weobley High School, Clee Hill Community Academy, Earl Mortimer College, Bishop's Castle Community College and Lacon Childe School. It will feature songs from the 50's through to the present day, music from the shows, rock and roll, classical and a whole lot more.


Speaking about the concert, organiser Tom Hunt of Ludlow Rotary Club said "It is wonderful that these young people have been inspired to help end polio by performing this concert, for until polio is totally eradicated every child is at risk of this highly infectious, potentially life-threatening and paralysing disease."

He added "There is no cure for polio but there is a safe and effective vaccine which we need to continue to roll out until there are no more cases. Rotary is in the vanguard of efforts to bring polio to an end. Since its involvement the number of cases world-wide has reduced from 350,000 in 1985 to just 12 in 2023, and the world could be polio free in 2024. When the world is finally confirmed to be polio free, it will be just the second human disease ever to be eradicated after smallpox."

BISHOP'S CASTLE COMMUNITY HEAT & WIND NETWORK

The project had its 2½ minutes of fame on Channel 4's 'The *Great Climate Fight*' in October – but if you blinked you'd have missed it! Some people got the impression from the programme that the project had hit a brick wall, which is far from the truth; we're looking forward to significant progress over the next 12 months. Apologies to all those towns people who gave their time to talk to the film crew – both in favour and against the project – but whose views weren't included.

Now that the Town Council have approved the project's inclusion in the *Place Plan*, some funded work has begun on delivering the studies needed for the full Planning Application. Further funding will be needed to complete this tranche of work, and a bid for £100k for this purpose has been submitted to the Department of Energy's *Community Energy Fund*.

The work to be undertaken includes a Detailed Design & Plan for the Network infrastructure, an Ecology and a Noise study for the Wind Turbine and a Finance and Business Model. In addition we will be seeking expressions of interest from house-holders and businesses for connection to the network, and there will, of course, be further public meetings.

Contract discussions are in hand with the landowners, Beamond & Partners, with regard to the Conery site for the Wind Turbine.
