Bishop's Castle Surgery

Personnel changes

There are a number of changes taking place at the surgery in the coming months. Many patients have been affected by the suspension of the phlebotomy service over the summer. They will be relieved to hear that a new member of staff has now been recruited, Sophia Right, a health care assistant. Among Sophia's duties will be phlebotomy so that bloods will continue to be taken at the Practice.

Due to personal circumstances both Dr Marwan Al-Nasiri and Dr Tom Davies will be leaving the Practice over the next few months. Both doctors are very popular with patients and staff and will be greatly missed. We wish them well for the future.

We welcome the news that the Practice will shortly have two new partners. Dr Caron Morton will join as a partner in the autumn. She is a very experienced GP who has worked at Bishop's Castle Medical Practice previously and is looking forward to returning. Dr Morton is also a partner at Station Drive Surgery in Ludlow and brings a wealth of management experience alongside her clinical skills. In the New Year Dr. David Mitchell, also from Station Drive Surgery, will be joining the Practice. Drs Morton and Mitchell will be managing partners in the Practice and will provide some clinical sessions. Dr. Morton and Dr. Mitchell will remain partners at Station Drive Surgery, and this will allow staff from both practices to work with and learn from each other. The two surgeries will work more closely in the future while maintaining their own identities, teams, patient groups and premises.

Bishop's Castle Community Hospital will also benefit from our new doctors' involvement as they bring a wealth of experience from their work in Ludlow Community Hospital. We believe that the coming together of the two surgeries will provide our patients with greater stability and choice alongside some exciting future improvements.

Vaccination update

The Surgery is currently contacting patients who are eligible for vaccination against RSV (respiratory syncytial virus) a cold-like virus that can be dangerous for babies and older adults. Covid and flu vaccinations will begin in October at the Surgery. There will be a Saturday vaccination clinic on 12th October.

GP Collective Action

GPs are in dispute with the NHS over changes to their contract. This is not a strike but can involve GPs choosing a number of ways in which to bring pressure on the NHS. We have been assured that no action will be taken at Bishop's Castle Surgery that will affect patients. Rather, it will relate to data collection and form filling.

UP & RUNNING - hospital update

As readers will know, the inpatient part of our hospital took in its first patients on 15th.July this year, having opened for staff training a fortnight before that.

It is now fully staffed and all sixteen beds were occupied within a week of the opening date! As you can imagine, this meant a huge amount of work for Amanda and her staff team, all accomplished with the utmost professionalism and good humour.

The "horticultural wing" of the campaign group has bought and installed two half barrel planters and a watering rota has been established. We hope that is just the start of making the outside environment both calming and beautiful for patients to enjoy.

Many in the group also want to be involved in helping patients complete the obligatory "patient experience" questionnaire. This cannot be done by staff members, so the group would be ideally placed to undertake that for the Community Health Trust. We also want to volunteer to do some tea trolly duties. We are just waiting for the goahead from the Trust about both these activities, and the police checks that we will need before starting.

One last thing. The staff have said they would really like some audio book CDs, so if anybody has any that you have finished with, they can be put to really good use at our hospital.

Our Town Council is committed to Biodiversity in Bishop's Castle

Do you know what the term 'biodiversity' really means? I was unsure until recently!

Here is my attempt at an explanation.

Biodiversity is short for biological diversity, which is the variety of all

living things; us, our animals, plants and even microorganisms and the ways they interact and affect each other.

All living things work together as communities in ecosystems, like an intricate web, to maintain balance and support life on Earth.

In this article I will try to regularly identify an action that we can all do to support biodiversity.

Many man-made products used in our gardens and on our fields and crops are harmful.

The Town Council is supporting moves to ban the use of chemically based herbicides and pesticides. These products are harmful to us, our children, our pets and wildlife.

There are, however, alternatives that can be used, such as:

- Diluted acetic acid or baking soda mixes as a herbicide
- Combinations of natural herbs and products can be effective pesticides

In the words of the much missed Dr. Michael Mosely by doing "just one thing" we can help the Town Council and other agencies that are working to support biodiversity.

I aim to provide a regular update on the Town's progress on this issue and give you ideas and suggestions on actions we can all do simply and effectively at a low cost.

The Swimming Pool – more challenges.

Over £190,000 has now been raised towards the £250,000 target. This is a truly sensational achievement. This figure includes over £6,000 raised at the 'fan zone' to the success of Olympian Oliver Morgan who learnt to swim in the pool.

MICHAELMAS FAIR was wonderfully successful, not least for the

SpArC Pool campaign. Our café in Bank House gained an amazing \pounds 720, with repeated praise for the quality of the cakes. The Morris Dancers generously donated their collection - \pounds 174 – to us. Huge thanks to them, our cake makers and our volunteers on the day.



However there is a new challenge.

One area of the lining is now so badly worn that its rough edges could injure people. This area has been cordoned off, reducing lane swimming but allowing classes to remain unchanged.

The survival of the pool for this year was integral to the basic plan that had been put in place. It would have allowed the pool to be fully used this year with a properly planned 'renewal next year.



The options are whether: a) to undertake repairs, which could cost several thousand pounds or; b) to try to bring the replacement date forward where the financial shortfall of £50,000 is obviously a problem.

Shropshire Community Leisure Trust, which manages SpArC, and Shropshire Council are discussing the cost of potential repairs and whether the Council will pay to repair the pool temporarily, or whether an approach can be agreed to bring forward installation of a replacement lining.

The lead time for the major works is three months, which means that if we can bring the work forward, users would have to put up with the partial closure for that time. However



if a solution to the funding shortfall can be found this seems more sensible than paying several thousands of pounds for short-term repairs.

STOP PRESS!

The following email has just been received from Rhys Collins, the Partnership Manager of SCLT which is now contracted by Shropshire Council to manage SpArC:

Following a week of work by our technical team we are delighted to announce that we are in a position to reopen the pool to full capacity from tomorrow morning.

Whilst of course this is again a temporary repair we will monitor closely to ensure the safety of our swimmers is paramount.

I would like to extend thanks to Darren and his team who have made this happen I am sure we all, especially the swimmers among us, echo Rhys's thanks.

Anti-Social Behaviour

There has been an increasing number of complaints to the Council about Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) in Bishop's Castle. The issue is that unless these issues are properly 'logged' by the police they cannot act – and they have to be contacted by the individual concerned not a third party. The more individual complaints received, the more likely it is that the Police will be able to put in the necessary resources to deal with it as everything is prioritised on the basis of the amount of data held. We know there is an issue. Please therefore report anything you are concerned about.

Hello everyone, I am Damien Kelly your local Policing Inspector for South Shropshire. I have been made aware from the Town Council that there are some complaints of ASB in the Bishop's Castle town park. What is not clear statistically on Police systems is when, where, who or what this is. This is due to a lack of reporting formally to the Police. According to our data, there is no ASB 'issue' in the Town Park and I must balance my resources appropriately with the demand that we know of across the parishes of South Shropshire. Therefore my plea to members of the public experiencing ASB in the town park is to report it to us on-line at www.westmercia.police.uk or by telephone on 101 so that your incident can be appropriately recorded, risk assessed and resourced if necessary.

ASB is defined within the ASB Crime and Policing Act, 2014 as:

1. Conduct that has caused, or is likely to cause, harassment, alarm or distress to any person,

2. Conduct capable of causing nuisance or annoyance to a person in relation to that person's occupation of residential premises, or,

3. Conduct capable of causing housing-related nuisance or annoyance to any person.

It must be remembered however that there is a level of acceptability for certain areas at certain times (such as public houses when licensing hours conclude or play parks when children are likely to play).

The Local Authority is the lead agency for noise and Police will assist where criminality/violence is involved (or is likely to be involved) or

where a joined-up approach to tackle a persistent problem is needed. Not all ASB is criminal and Police, the Local Authority other services must balance everyone's freedom of enjoyment where criminality does not exist.

Your local policing team P.C. Stuart Coote, P.C.S.O Shaun Cullis and P.C.S.O. Calvin Brown are working with Shropshire County Council to come up with ideas to tackle ASB generally across the area. However without the key detail of what is happening on the Bishop's Castle Town Park, they are limited to just continuing their business-as-usual foot patrols.

My officers do frequently patrol the Town Park and engage with children when they are present, so please be reassured that we remain visible and approachable.

Church Clock Face

In the last issue it was also mentioned that The Bishop's Castle church tower clock dial was to be restored, work having last been carried out 25 years ago by local artists. This project has to gain various Church approvals which will take some time.

The clock dial restoration will be part of other events aimed at getting the Church clock back into full operation (e.g. the overhaul of the clock mechanism, re-programming of the automatic winding mechanism and improving the clock room flooring).

Resurfacing, road marking and the Neighbourhood Road Plan

Although there was a hiccup when an old Victorian conduit was unexpectedly found, the resurfacing work was satisfactorily completed in time for the Michaelmas Fair. It has made a dramatic improvement to the High street and Market Place.

The next steps are to put back road markings for disabled spaces and for access and to enable emergency vehicles to get through and to make adjustments at the Boar's Head Junction. Disabled parking – spaces will be located outside the pharmacy (2), auction yard (2), Market Place (1), Harley Jenkins car park (1). The space by the Town Hall is too steep to be usable.

It was recently announced that under the Neighbourhood Road Plan that a 20 MPH speed limit would be introduced near to the schools. The Council is still pressing for 'Access Only' signs to be introduced to keep heavy traffic and through traffic out of the conservation area.

Green Bins and Craven Arms Recycling Centre

As reported in the last issue, from 1 October 2024 we all need to subscribe to Shropshire Council's garden waste collection service if we want the Council to continue emptying our green garden bins. Some issues have been reported in trying to access the website – see below – but it is hoped that this has been resolved.

The annual subscription fee is £56 and will cover the period for 1 October 2024 to 30 September 2025. A payment window will be open from September 2024 until 31 March 2025. The charge will remain at £56 regardless of when we sign up.

Once we have signed up and paid, the Council will empty our garden waste on our scheduled collection day. However, if this is after the 1 October 2024 the later you leave it to subscribe the higher the chance that your collection day will change. If you don't subscribe, they won't empty your garden bin after 1 October 2024.

From this date food waste collections will be suspended and food

waste should be put in out black bins until a weekly collection service is introduced in 2026.

Council Budgets

As is widely known, all Councils are under financial pressure to cut costs. Shropshire County Council, which is responsible for roads/ highways and most of the Town's services, is no exception. To a degree, Enterprise House and SpArC are ring-fenced. However, there is talk that many libraries across the County are under threat to change their current opening hours or to close. The Unitary Councillor and the Town Council are working hard with Enterprise House to protect our library services and fighting to ensure that the impact on Bishop's Castle is as minimal as possible.

Old Market Square

Many of you may have noticed that the cobbles in the Old Market Square have been re-laid. The area has been generally tidied and new benches have been installed. Work continues to make the Square a more attractive place for residents and visitors to relax and enjoy. There is quite a lot more to do especially with regard to upgrading signage and the provision of information about the Town and its history. Thanks are due to a small team, mainly who live around the Square, for their hard work - particularly those who maintain the stunning flower planters and keep the weeds down.

The Mayor

The Mayor plans to be in the Town Hall from 1pm - 4.30 every Monday if town residents have any questions.

Free Help to Get Online for Shropshire Residents

Do you feel a little lost using technology? Need help using the internet? Do you feel nervous about using a computer or frustrated about being left behind as everything seems to be online these days?

Getting to grips with the internet means you can keep in touch with friends and family, get up-to-date information and see the latest news, have shopping delivered to your door and better manage your health and finances.

Shropshire Council is supporting residents to learn to use technology safely through The Digital Skills Programme at Enterprise House, Bishop's Castle. The service has 25 digital hubs across the area for people who need help to use their laptops, mobile phones or tablets. Learning slowly, taking small steps and having the time to practice are keys to success.

The programme is delivered by experienced, friendly digital volunteers based within Shropshire Libraries and local community organisations. Free data and devices are available for those in greatest need.

The deteriorating condition of the River Clun and its tributaries by Tom Wall

The Environment Agency routinely monitors the condition of rivers, including the Clun, and every three years makes an assessment of their chemical and ecological status. For this purpose, the Clun and its principal tributaries are divided into eight river reaches, as shown in the table; the principal tributaries are the Folly Brook, Unk, Kemp and Redlake. The Environment Agency also assesses the Snakescroft Brook, a tributary of the Kemp; this is because the Brook takes the outfall from Bishop's Castle's Sewage Treatment Works.

The chemical status of each reach is assessed as either Good or Failing, and in common with all rivers in England, all reaches within the Clun catchment are now found to be Failing. What does this mean? And why is it the case?

The Environment Agency also assesses the ecological status of the river and its tributaries using various water, habitat and biological quality tests. It then attributes each reach to one of five categories: High, Good, Moderate, Poor or Bad.

In 2013, all but one of the reaches then assessed were considered Good, now all but one are no better than Moderate (Mod in the table <u>overleaf</u>). These assessments are shown below; they are made according to the Water Framework Directive - Ecological Classification.

What needs to be done to return the River Clun and its tributaries to their former Good ecological status and to improve their chemical status? What can each of us do to help in this endeavour? This article has been sent to the Environment Agency. It is hoped that they will let us know.

Our assortment of 'wild collectibles' - which includes relics of wild animal remains from skulls and pelts to droppings and chewed up nuts - is popular with the little ones, feeding their growing curiosity.

We encourage these children to come along to our 'Going Wild Kid's club', where they get to explore and have fun in the rambling wild country, learn to



identify different plants and animals, and begin to fascinate themselves with and respect nature, securing a future for the environment by fuelling their passion, excitement and care for it.

Of course we cannot leave the grown-ups out of the fun, because they are able to get involved with our wildlife and conservation work. So far, activities have included cutting and raking the grass and flowers at St John's Churchyard, ready

for a heavenly wildflower meadow next year where our loved ones can rest; maintaining our road verges, helping to create a vibrant habitat corridor for wildlife and allowing our two worlds to merge together harmoniously.

Finally, everyone can get involved in our regular (now monthly) Moth Mornings, where we all enjoy some tea and biscuits, and familiarise ourselves with the world of moths by identifying the many species we caught in the moth traps the night before (at a different location every time) and realise just how unique and important these little creatures are!

But we are only just getting started, we still have a long way to go with im-

proving local green spaces Bishop's Castle. We need to collaborate with local volunteers and ecologists to make habitat management plans and enact them, as well as species lists to prove it's all working. Upcoming events include an 'Apple Pressing Kid's Club' fundraiser on the 6th October, and you can expect our winter talks the



first Tuesday of every month from October - March at Bishop's Castle Town Hall, the first one will be given by Dan and will be about the project itself. We'll be hosting a lot more winter events too, so keep an eye out!

Vaccination update




